The Foundation contributed funding for a video recording studio and turned TDCAA into a robust online training organization. Also important, TDCAF continued expansion of the Texas Prosecutors Society with the induction of 22 new members. Finally, we resurrected the TDCAF website after an extended absence. All told, TDCAA has been fortunate to weather the pandemic storm and overcome numerous challenges, and TDCAF has stood by its side, supporting the mission by providing financial resources to meet the need.

This new year represents TDCAF's 15th year in existence, and our work never been more imperative. The TDCAF board has recommitted itself to meet the challenges ahead. With government funding for training ever-decreasing, the Foundation can step in to support excellence in Texas prosecution. The Foundation's leadership believes that Texans share our vision of a safer state, and having well-trained and equipped professional champions in the courtroom can make a real difference. With your help, our future is bright.

So, at the risk of tempting fate, I'll try a second time to end where we began: We can't wait to see what's around the corner in 2021! And as always, I thank you for your continued support.


What TDCAF does

In its 15 years of existence, the Texas District and County Attorneys Foundation (TDCAF) has never seen a year like 2020. That's likely true for everyone reading this report, and we all have been through the wringer, professionally and personally, over the past several months. Now more than ever, it's clear why the Foundation is so important to the mission and purpose of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association (TDCAA).

TDCAA is the professional association for Texas prosecutors, and it has been around for more than 100 years. Our 6,367 members—a number that swells every year—include prosecutors, investigators, support staff, defense attorneys, judges, and law students, and they need training, technical assistance, and other help in seeing that justice is done. Without effective advocates both in and outside the courtroom, crime victims and members of the public will not get the justice they deserve.

Grants support a portion of the training we produce, but government funding for training is ever-decreasing and the number of prosecutors and staff who need it is always increasing. (See the chart below for a breakdown of where we

get our funding.) Without money from other sources, such as the Foundation, TDCAA could not meet the needs of its members and law enforcement. Read on to find out how we served Texas prosecutors and staff in 2020.

What TDCAF did in 2020

Training

Normally, TDCAA produces more than 60 (!) in-person conferences a year all over the state to provide 7,000-plus people more than 50,000 hours of continuing legal education. That's a lot—these numbers rank us among the top out of more than 1,500 CLE providers. But the COVID-19 pandemic and subsequent lockdown halted our regular business of putting on live courses, though we were able to host two inperson conferences in early 2020 before the shutdown.

In March, we quickly pivoted to producing courses that could be watched online (both live and pre-recorded). The Foundation Board sprung to action to approve and fund the creation of a film studio in TDCAA headquarters. TDCAA had created video training before, but not the number or frequency of courses we produced in 2020. By the end of the year, we had put together 11 online conferences. Topics included general advocacy, mental health, caseload management, domestic violence, and courtroom testimony in DWI cases. Several courses were pre-recorded so that viewers could stream them at their own pace from home or work, while a couple were conducted live over Zoom. All told in 2020, TDCAA trained 3,561 prosecutors, staff, and law enforcement officers with a

total of 33,050 hours of training. Pretty impressive given the widespread confusion in the wake of the shutdowns, as well as the steep learning curve, which included converting a little-used library in the TDCAA office into a recording studio, hiring film crews to record experts giving presentations, editing the raw footage into high-quality courses, and tweaking the TDCAA website to accommodate all of it. And of course, doing all of this work while staying 6 feet away from every other person!








Publications

Another key to educating prosecutors, especially in a year with so few opportunities for networking and in-person gatherings, is publications. In 2020, TDCAA produced six criminal law books for prosecutors and law enforcement officers. Three of these—
Family Violence, Jury Selection, and Mental Health Law for Prosecutors—are brand-new offerings meant to help prosecutors navigate the difficult waters of tricky topics. The other three were updated editions of previously published books: Investigation & Prosecution of Child Sexual Abuse, Intoxication Manslaughter, and Writs. TDCAA publishes more than 30 books and manuals in all, including electronic versions of code books, to educate prosecutors and staff on a wide breadth of criminal law topics. The Foundation has been instrumental in getting many of these publications into the hands of the professionals who need them.

Victims Services

The Foundation helps underwrite our Victims Services Director position to improve legislatively mandated but largely unfunded crime victim services in prosecutor's offices. Normally, Jalayne Robinson, our Victim Services Director, criss-crosses the state in any given year to on-board new victim assistance coordinators (VACs), prosecutors, and other staff, but in 2020, much of that work moved online. Still, Jalayne accomplished much in the last year when she:

- presented victim services training in person and via Zoom to 436 prosecutors, prosecutor office staff, and victim services personnel at multiple TDCAA courses, including the Prosecutor Skills Trial Course, Key Personnel & Victim Assistance Coordinator Conference, and Newly Elected Boot Camp;
- provided ongoing daily email and telephone support to Texas VACs and prosecutors;

- served as project director for our Office of the Governor Criminal Justice Division VOCA grant, including grant writing and grant administration;
 - assisted in developing VOCA grant training;
 - assisted with coordinating the TDCAA Key

Personnel—Victim Services Board, including conducting board member elections via Zoom and corresponding with Board members;

- wrote a regular column for TDCAA's journal, *The Texas Prosecutor*;
- moderated discussion forums at the Key Personnel & Victim Assistance Coordinator Conference; and
- represented TDCAA in policy development and service coordination with state agencies and other nonprofits assisting victims.

Texas Prosecutors Society (TPS)

n 2011, under the direction of then-Board Chair Dan Boulware and Endowment Chair Tom Krampitz, the Foundation established a select group of supporters called the Texas Prosecutors Society. This invitation was for those who have demonstrated an interest in and commitment to improving

prosecution and training in Texas, whether they serve as current prosecutors, criminal defense attorneys, or judges; they

practice in another area of law; or they are enjoying retirement. We are proud that so many current and former prosecutors have joined these ranks.

Texas Prosecutors Society members have pledged \$2,500 each to create an endowment fund for the

Foundation—a forward-thinking strategy for building stability and growth for both the Foundation and the Association. The endowment's purpose is to collect and invest funds for the future to provide critical support to the Association.

Each year, new inductees of the Society are recognized at a special reception at TDCAA's Elected Prosecutor Conference in December. 2020's reception has been postponed until it can happen in person, but that didn't stop 22 people from joining TPS in 2020. As of this writing, the Society now consists of 204 members. It will continue to grow as more prosecutors and distinguished alumni are invited to join every year. We are grateful for these contributions (when local needs have already been met) and have committed that all such funds are "restricted"—meaning, they are used only for training, without any expenditures for Foundation overhead and the like.
