Questions for Strangulation Expert

I. Laying the Foundation

- A. Occupation
 - 1. What is your occupation?
 - 2. How long have you been employed in that capacity?
 - 3. Describe the responsibility of your position.
- B. Education/training
 - 1. What is your educational background?
 - 2. What was your area of concentration?
 - 3. What additional studies have you undertaken?
- C. Licenses/certificates
 - 1. Do you hold any licenses or certificates related to your profession?
 - 2. What was required of you to obtain these?
 - 3. What is required to maintain your licenses/certificates?
- D. Professional affiliations
 - 1. Do you belong to any professional organizations?
 - 2. What are the nature and purposes of these organizations?
- E. Training/teaching experience
 - 1. Have you attended conferences or trainings specific to strangulation? Explain specifics.
 - 2. Have you conducted any training or teaching yourself?
 - a. For whom did you conduct these training sessions and programs?
 - b. What areas were covered in that training?
 - c. How many attended these training sessions?
 - d. How often do you conduct training sessions?
- F. Previous expert testimony
 - 1. Have you testified in court previously as an expert?
 - 2. How many times?
 - 3. For the defense or the prosecution?
- G. Do you have scientific, technical, or other specialized knowledge that could assist the jury to understand the evidence regarding strangulation?

II. General Discussion of Strangulation

- A. Structures involved (Use diagram of neck)
 - 1. Could you please describe the structures in the neck involved in the flow of blood to and from the brain? Structures involved in breath/airflow?
 - 2. Please explain how these structures are vulnerable to external pressure.
 - 3. Discuss how little pressure is required to impede these structures. (Use hand dynamometer if available.)
 - 4. Use a tube/hose to demonstrate that impeding doesn't mean fully blocking but simply slowing flow of breath or blood (or save to end of questioning)
- B. Terms
 - 1. Please explain strangulation in general terms.
 - 2. Please explain the difference between strangulation and choking.
 - 3. What are the methods of strangulation? (e.g., manual, ligature, hanging)
 - 4. Please describe how blood flow can be occluded during manual strangulation.
 - 5. Please describe how air flow can be impeded during manual strangulation.
 - 6. How can a person die during strangulation from occlusion of blood flow?
 - 7. How can a person die during strangulation from occlusion of air flow?
 - 8. How can a person die after being strangled?
 - 9. Would victims who survive strangulation necessarily have visible injuries? Why not?

- C. Experience with strangulation
 - 1. Have you performed an autopsy/treated/interviewed a person who has been strangled?
 - 2. If so, how many? In what circumstances?
 - 3. Have you examined literature regarding survivors of strangulation?
 - iv. What are some potential medical complications for victims of strangulation?
- D. Signs and symptoms of strangulation
 - 1. What is a "sign" versus a "symptom"?
 - 2. What are the signs of strangulation?
 - 3. What are the symptoms of strangulation?
 - 4. Are the signs and symptoms of strangulation different for manual v. ligature strangulation?
 - 5. Which of signs and symptoms would you describe as resulting from internal injuries? Which result from external injuries?
 - 6. How long can these be expected to last?
 - 7. Please compare injury from occlusion to acute injury. Would it help to discuss the physical sensation of hitting your "funny bone"?
 - 8. How do these compare with strangulation?
 - 9. Please describe the signs and symptoms of impeding the flow of blood to the brain. (Expert can go through signs and symptoms already admitted and included on chart.)
 - 10. Please describe the signs and symptoms of impeding the flow of blood from the brain. (Expert can go through signs and symptoms already admitted and included on chart.)
 - 11. Please describe the signs and symptoms of impeding breathing by applying pressure to a person's neck or throat. (Expert can go through signs and symptoms already admitted and included on chart.)
 - 12. Are there any potential physical consequences of strangulation that develop over time? Please describe.
 - 13. Please describe the emotional stages leading up to unconsciousness.
 - 14. What happens if strangulation continues after a person is unconscious?
 - 15. Please describe the relative vulnerability of the neck to the arm.
- E. Evidence of defensive wounds
 - 1. Is it common for victims of strangulation to inflict injuries on themselves? How?
 - 2. Do victims sometimes inflict injuries on the perpetrator during strangulation? Please describe. (Useful for the bite mark on chest of perpetrator who used a "chokehold" or any other defensive injury.)

III. Hypothetical Questions

Please assume the following facts....[Describe the facts in evidence from the testimony of the police officer, the victim, and witnesses.]

- 1. In your opinion, are these facts consistent with someone who has been strangled??
- 2. Return to each specific piece of evidence that correspond to the descriptions already given.

IV. Fact Witness

[This assumes medical records have been admitted using business records and statements for purposes of medical diagnosis.]

- 1. Now directing you to the records for treatment of the victim, please describe what signs of strangulation were observed externally.
- 2. Please describe what signs of strangulation were observed internally.
- 3. Please describe what symptoms of strangulation were reported or observed.
- 4. How are these consistent with strangulation?
